“One of the benefits of this course is its flexibility,” added Cruse. “For example, renters can take the course on their schedule because it’s available online and is mobile compatible. Participants can also choose to complete only those sections that interest them. In addition, the course is free and open to anyone who would like to learn more about renting.”
